Friday nights has become a dinner with friends' night with a new surprise every week. We have sampled a wide variety of dishes from our club kitchen, all home cooked, prepared with love as that special ingredient. While eating and drinking the club has seen a number of fun games played and artists drop in. Sjoelen, tabletop horse racing, two-up, Bingo, Klaverjassen, Triominos, bowling, indoor golf, dart ball, to name a few.
