Western Australia welcomes NEI evacuees for rehabilitation from Japanese internment camps and the Indonesian Revolution




The evacuees were transported to Australia from the NEI on the hosp[ital ship 'Oranje'.




In 1945, a second consignment of Dutch were evacuated to WA for rehabilitation from Japanese POW and internee camps and the Indonesian revolution. They were accommodated in WA hotels, hostels and private homes organised for them by Netherlands Welfare Organisation for Evacuees (NIWOE). The Cloisters, in St George Tce, was refurbished to become the Dutch club and headquarters for NIWOE. The younger Dutch children were rehabilitated at Fairbridge Farm School, Pinjarra. The older children were educated in a makeshift High School in Burt Hall, St Georges Cathedral, Perth. A Dutch medical centre was established at Westminister Hospital. These Dutch were repatriated to Netherlands or NEI in 1946. By this time Australian Unions were boycotting Dutch shipping in support of Indonesian Independence and this added another layer of difficulty to their plight.
